While the reciprocal relationship of politics and emotions is not new, the amplification and acceleration thereof, particularly by means of social media, is. From the Scottish Independence Referendum and Brexit to Covid-19, immigration, austerity and climate policies, emotions have proven to be key components in affecting social and cultural politics.

This conference focuses on the connection between emotions and cultural politics, examining how emotions shape and are shaped by political events. The event looks at how emotions have intensified political discourse and considers how emotions are used strategically in political debates, with terms like empathy and indignation either being embraced or dismissed. The central theme of the conference is how emotional dynamics drive societal divisions, solidify group identities, and impact democratic processes.
